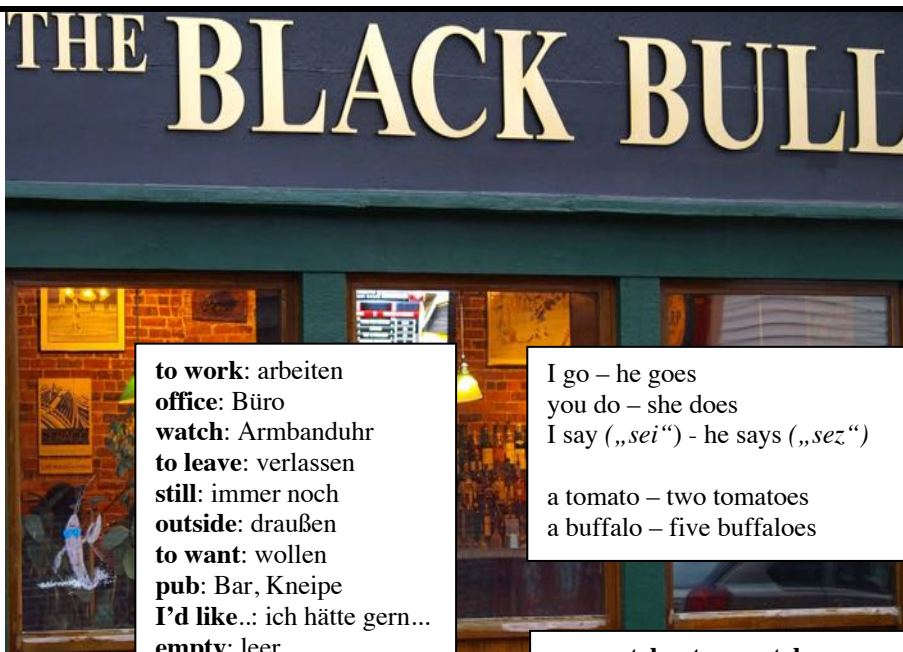


Simon works in an office.

office: Büro
watch: Armbanduhr
to leave: verlassen
still: immer noch
outside: draußen
to want: wollen
pub: Bar, Kneipe
I'd like..: ich hätte gern...
empty: leer
would: würde
another: ein(e) weiter(e)r
one: (Stützwort) „eins“
should: sollte

I go – he goes
 you do – she does
 I say („sei“) - he says („sez“)
 a tomato – two tomatoes
 a buffalo – five buffaloes

one watch – two watches
one glass – two glasses
an office - all offices
a bus – many busses
a secretary - two secretaries
a boy - three boys

VERNEINUNG: Vollverben werden mit DO umschrieben:

I speak English. – I don't speak English.
 We drink beer. – We don't drink beer.
 She likes beer. – She doesn't like beer.
 Aber:
 He's a secretary. - He isn't a secretary.
 (kein Vollverb)
 Look at me. – Don't look at me.
 Give me a glass of beer. - Don't give me an empty glass.
