Das Futur kann auf zwei Arten ausgedrückt werden.

1. Mit dem Hilfsverb **will** (auch: **shall**). He will go for a walk. His master won't (=will not) find the leash.
2. Mit **going to**. It's going to rain. We aren't going to leave the house.
